**Engage in Civil Discourse:** Civil discussion strengthens democracy. Talk with people holding different views and engage respectfully. Constructive dialogue fosters understanding and weakens the adversaries' influence.

**Promote Unity:** Across political divides, work toward the shared goal of a stronger America. Emphasize our common values—freedom, democracy, and respect for the rule of law. Remind each other that unity is essential, especially in turbulent times.
